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LOSFA Launches Third Annual “FLY” Tour

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA) is set to launch its third annual “Financial Literacy for You (FLY) Tour.” The live performance, which is written and performed by LOSFA’s Public Information and Communications staff members Kendra Woods, Britt Kelly, Justin Marshall and Ebony Holmes, will be presented at select high schools throughout the state from April 15-19.

The program will deal with everything from credit and money management to financial aid for college and will attempt to impress upon high school students the impact that a variety of financial decisions made early in their lives can have on their long term futures. The production will also highlight a number of the college access, scholarship, and grant programs administered by LOSFA.

The FLY tour will take place during April, which is recognized in the United States as National Financial Literacy Month. In 2000, The Jump\$tart Coalition for Personal Financial Literacy began promoting April as Financial Literacy for Youth Month in an effort to highlight the importance of financial literacy and teach Americans how to establish and maintain healthy financial habits.

In 2003, the United States Senate designated April as Financial Literacy for Youth Month. In March 2004 the Senate passed Resolution 316 that officially recognized April as National Financial Literacy Month.

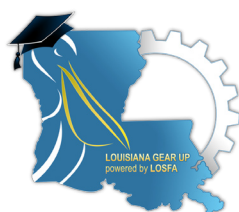


Louisiana GEAR UP Announces Summer Transition Programs

Louisiana GEAR UP has funded Summer Transition Programs (STPs) for 2013 at four universities. In total, fifteen individual weeks of STP programming will occur throughout June and July serving up to 860 rising 11th and 12th graders from the 30 Louisiana GEAR UP Participating high schools from across the State.

This summer STPs will provide ACT preparation, planning for the practical aspects of applying for college and financial aid using the Louisiana

Connect College & Career Readiness web portal, as well as an immersion in the college life experience to participating students. Additionally, some STPs will provide Science, Technology, Engineering, & Mathematics (STEM) Science, Technology, Engineering, Art/Design, & Mathematics (STEAM), or career exploration themed programming.

Applications Being Accepted for John R. Justice Student Loan Repayment Program

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA) is currently accepting applications for the John R. Justice Student Loan Repayment Program.

The John R. Justice Student Loan Repayment Program in Louisiana provides for the payment of eligible educational loans (both Federal Family Education Loan Program [FFELP] and Federal Direct Loans) for state and federal public defenders and state prosecutors employed in Louisiana who agree to remain employed as public defenders and prosecutors for at least three years.

This year there are six \$5,000 awards for public defenders and 12 \$2,500 awards for prosecutors.

The application is now available and the deadline to apply is April 30, 2013. To check eligibility requirements

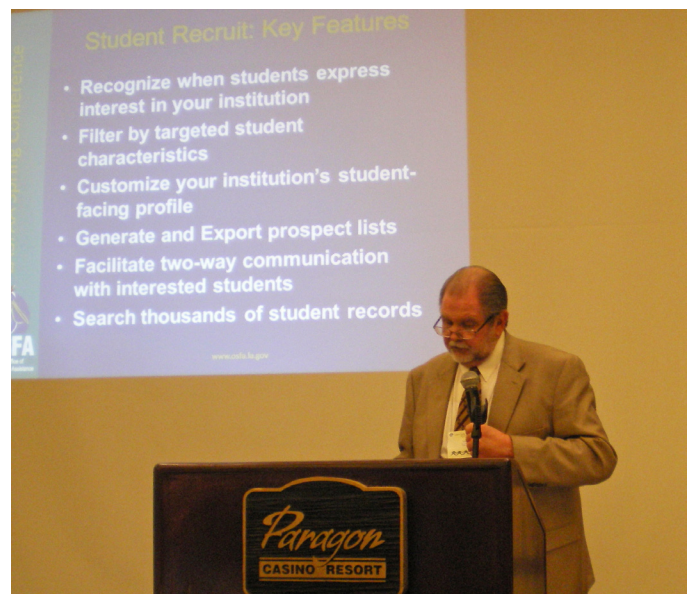


LOSFA Representatives Attend LASFAA Conference

LOSFA Preparing for 20th Anniversary Trailblazer Camp

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA) will hold its 20th annual Trailblazer camps this summer. The first camp will be held at Northwestern in Natchitoches on July 14-16. The second camp will be at Nicholls in Thibodaux on July 21-23. This year marks the sixth time that Nicholls has hosted a camp and the 19th for Northwestern.

Trailblazer camps are comprehensive, three-day training workshops conducted by financial aid professionals for the purpose of educating selected high school students about the college admissions process and about how to obtain financial assistance for postsecondary education. Attendees receive training on a variety of subjects, such as TOPS, FAFSA, Financial Aid, College Goal Sunday, Financial Literacy and other LOSFA programs.

After attending camp, Trailblazers return to their high schools and, under the supervision of their professional school counselor, share their knowledge of financial aid procedures with their peers.

This year marks the 20th anniversary since the first Trailblazer camps were held in 1994. LOSFA will celebrate the occasion with special activities during the camps. Throughout the last 19 years, 3,261 students have gone through the program. LOSFA is hoping to draw a record number of attendees to this year's camps.

To participate, a high school must nominate a qualified current junior who is enthusiastic about the opportunity of being a Trailblazer. To be considered, students must be college bound, academically outstanding, effective public speakers and leaders among their peers. The success of the program depends solely upon the students' initiative in disseminating the information they have learned.
