And so it begins...the journey of the senior year in high school. Those of us that remember that year think we know what's on the minds of the students we serve. But how can we be sure?

We've spent our summer here at LOSFA examining our services, thinking about what worked well and thinking about what we could improve upon. We came to the conclusion that the greatest challenge for our agency is to 'take it to the seats'. In other words we feel it is critical for us to ensure that our services are meeting the needs of the students we serve.

We also came to the conclusion that the best way to do that would be to ask the students to tell us their areas of greatest concern regarding going to college. We polled our Trailblazers and we polled our GEAR UP summer transition program attendees.

Here's what they asked:

How will I pay for college tuition?
What classes should I take?
How do I narrow down my scholarship options?
Will I be accepted into college?
Will I be eligible for scholarships?
How do I write a college essay?

How can I increase my ACT score?

Will I have debt after graduating from college? What are the ACT requirements to get into college? What will be the best college choice for me? How do I decide what I will major in?

Here's what they said:

I would like better quality teachers at my high school. I would like ACT prep.

I need help finding scholarships.

I believe that more students would participate if they knew more about the programs available to them. Students need to know what programs like GEAR UP mean to people. They need to hear how these programs can help them.

Students are interested in college but they don't have money and don't know much about financial aid so it is easy to get discouraged.

Two groups of students, same theme, same fears, same concerns...

Same anticipation, same excitement, same opportunities...

Bottom line is: There's never been a better time to do what we are all committed to.

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LASFAC Adopts Emergency Rules to Implement Program Changes Enacted During the Recent Legislative Session

At its July 17, 2014 meeting, the Executive Committee of the Louisiana Student Financial Assistance Commission approved Emergency Rules and Notice of Intent that implement Acts 566, 733, 737, and 837 of the 2014 Regular Session of the Louisiana Legislature.

ACT 566 - TOPS and TOPS TECH

Beginning with 2018 graduates, students can meet the TOPS Core Curriculum social studies requirement for civics by earning one unit from the following: Government, Civics, AP US Government and Politics: Comparative, or AP US Government and Politics: United States.

Beginning with 2018 graduates, Economics, AP Macroeconomics and AP Microeconomics are added to the list of social studies electives from which students must earn two units.

Act 733 - TOPS and TOPS TECH

Beginning with students graduating in 2018, adds certain honors, talented, and articulated courses that will be converted to a five-point scale for calculating the grade point average for TOPS eligibility.

Makes the administering agency responsible for defining "skill or occupational training" for the purpose of the TOPS Tech, Opportunity, Performance and Honors Award. Previously, the Board of Regents was responsible for this determination.

Revises the definition of "Skill and Occupational Training" by deleting references to the Board of Regents and adding "any training leading to an Industry-Based Certification, a Certificate of Applied Science or a Certificate of Technical Sciences approved by the Workforce Investment Council offered by a provider recognized by the Louisiana Workforce Commission."

Adds the TOPS Opportunity Award core curriculum for 2018 high school graduates to the list of core curriculums that may be used to meet the TOPS Tech initial eligibility requirements.

Provides that BESE may approve changes to course names and equivalencies for AP and IB courses.

Act 737 - TOPS and TOPS TECH

Changes the TOPS core curriculum for the Opportunity, Performance and Honors Awards to allow one unit of drafting to substitute for Fine Arts Survey through 2017 and to use one unit of drafting to substitute for one art unit beginning in 2018.

Changes the TOPS Tech core to allow one unit of drafting to substitute for one unit of Fine Arts Survey.

Allows students to qualify for TOPS Tech using the TOPS core for the Opportunity, Performance and Honors Awards for 2018 graduates.

Deletes the TOPS Tech core requirement to earn one unit of Chemistry or Applied Chemistry and requires two units of science from the list of TOPS Tech science subjects and adds Chemistry and Applied Chemistry to the list.

Act 737 - TOPS TECH EARLY START

Provides that the TOPS-Tech Early Start award can be used to enroll in programs to pursue certifications approved by the Workforce Investment Council.

Deletes the graduation exit exam requirements.

Allows nonpublic postsecondary education institutions offering courses leading to an Industry-Based Certification, a Certificate of Applied Science, and/or

a Certificate of Technical Sciences in a top demand occupation to participate in the TOPS-Tech Early Start program.

Allows up to five Louisiana training providers recognized by the Workforce Commission and approved by BESE to participate in the TOPS-Tech Early Start program. Note that these providers may be, but are not necessarily nonpublic postsecondary education institutions.

Personally Identifiable Information

ACT 837

Provides policies and procedures for the collection, receipt, use, protection and destruction of personally identifiable information.

These procedures include requirements for consent from a parent or guardian for the public schools to collect and disclose certain personally identifiable information related to sixth through twelfth grade students to LOSFA to make it possible for the agency to guide and motivate these students to prepare for and achieve eligibility for college financial aid programs, and to allow LOSFA to determine eligibility for financial aid programs, including the Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS).

Requests for Exception to the Requirements to Maintain Continuous Full-Time Enrollment and to Earn 24 Hours During The Academic Year

In other action, LASFAC approved an Emergency Rule to change the maximum length of an exception for parental leave from, "Up to two consecutive semesters (three consecutive quarters) per pregnancy", to, "Up to the equivalent of one academic year (college) per pregnancy."

This aligns the period of exception with the current academic year (college), which now includes summer terms.

140 Rising High School Seniors Attend Trailblazer Camp

Another year of Trailblazer Camps has passed, with 140 rising senior high school students from across Louisiana gathering at Northwestern State University and at Nicholls State University to learn about college access and financial assistance. Two of those campers walked away with \$1,000 scholarships provided by our friends at LELA (Louisiana Education Loan Authority) and all walked away with a deeper knowledge of what it takes to pay for higher education.

But the major focus of this year's camps was introducing

the Trailblazers to LOSFA's new service model geared to a much more comprehensive approach to college access including:

- More LOSFA-sponsored motivational events
- More information on admission standards
- More information on application deadlines and awareness of associated fees (application fees, housing registration fees, orientation fees, etc.)

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Trailblazer Camp continued

- More information on summer bridge programs to ease the transition from high school to college and to meet any required developmental course prerequisites for college admission
- More emphasis on the advantages of earning postsecondary credit while in high school
- More emphasis on selecting the right postsecondary institution for the individual student's career goals, financial situation, and social/emotional comfort level
- More hands-on follow-up with application filing assistance and FAFSA completion assistance

 More recognition for students who are accepted to the postsecondary institution of their choice

The 2014 Trailblazers seemed to completely buy-in to their critical mission to serve as peer counselors to their fellow students and to help convey the importance of utilizing all of the information provided by LOSFA to ensure a smooth transition from high school to postsecondary education and to acquire the funding necessary to achieve their dreams.
