#### From the Desk of the Executive Director

February is Financial Aid Awareness Month. Despite the fact that it is always Financial Aid Awareness month at LOSFA, we still acknowledge the month as such and take advantage of every opportunity to increase awareness of financial aid programs. That is why we're launching the month with our ninth annual "Call-In Night" on Monday, February 1st from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM. Our Public Information and Communications staff is normally available to answer telephone calls from the public Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, but for one night every year we extend those hours to accommodate those who may be unable to call during normal business hours. Our staff will be available to answer questions about TOPS, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, the Go Grant and other aid programs and general financial aid inquiries.

Another important component of Financial Aid Awareness Month is our annual College Goal Sunday Event. So much time and energy goes into planning this event at 17 different sites throughout the state that it's hard to believe that the date is almost here.

## State budget cuts trim GO Grant appropriation

Pending final approval by Gov. Bobby Jindal, this year's funding for the GO Grant program will be cut by \$7,796,892.

The cut is the result of budget reductions ordered by the governor to reduce the state's projected budget deficit. LOSFA's share of the reductions is \$7.8 million and cutting the GO Grant was the "least onerous cut we could make" Executive Director Melanie Amrhein said.

The agency's administrative costs paid through the state general funds are far less than could be absorbed in a cut this size, Amrhein said. There has been discussion about possible cuts to the TOPS program and, because of statutory language, a request has been sent to the state Attorney General's office asking for clarification on the issue.

Cutting the GO Grant funding at this point will not affect any students currently receiving the grant, Amrhein said. Recent changes in the grant's funding

formula will allow LOSFA to fund all students currently benefiting from the GO Grant at their present level, even after absorbing the budget reduction, through the end of this school year. Schools will be notified after the March 24th billing deadline about re-allocating any surplus funds where needed.

The next few months will determine funding levels for the upcoming academic year.

Dr. Michael Gargano, Louisiana Student Financial Assistance Commission member (representing the LSU Board of Supervisors), was not pleased that the state's need-based financial aid program was cut, instead of TOPS, which is merit based.

'TOPS is a great program," he said, "but we need something equally as great in need-based aid that is statutorily protected."

The Go Grant program is not statutorily protected. It may be cut or eliminated by the legislature any year.

### **TOPS Tech a success at eligible Proprietary and Cosmetology schools**

Thanks to changes initiated last year, TOPS Tech students wishing to pursue a degree at eligible cosmetology and proprietary schools are now able to do so and take full advantage of their award.

Beginning in September 2009, 56 new learning institutions began accepting TOPS payments. So far, LOSFA has processed two rounds of billing for the new institutions, with the third round scheduled for March 1. Students wishing to take advantage of their TOPS Tech award at a cosmetology or proprietary school need to be enrolled before that date.

Pricilla Marcel, owner of Omega Institute of Cosmetology in Houma, said "Word is getting around."

"We do question the students who are inquiring about school now and the May graduates [about their TOPS status]. High schools are letting the students know" that the awards may be used at cosmetology and proprietary schools. "As of now we have 3 eligible students," she said. "The true test for us will be this coming fall. As far as the process, it seems easy. We just have to work out the current enrolled students. LOSFA's staff has been very patient,

knowledgeable and great to work with."

Eddy Caillier-Dillard, a Financial Aid Leader with Blue Cliff College in Houma, agreed.

"We have several students using the TOPS Tech and the biggest benefit is that it helps us compete with state community colleges. The students are very surprised when I tell them we accept TOPS Tech. The process is easy and Linda Gooch (of LOSFA's Scholarship and Grants Division) is always offering help if I need it. She really watches my input of information and checks to see if all is well."

Proprietary and Cosmetology schools offer degrees and certificates in programs not typically available at 4-year colleges or universities, such as dental assistant, medical assistant, pharmacy technician, air conditioning & heating/refrigeration technology and massage therapy. To determine if a school is eligible to accept TOPS Tech, contact the school's financial aid department.

## LOSFA stays open during holiday to accept START deposits

Despite Dec. 31 being a proclaimed state holiday, a small group of LOSFA employees remained on duty to accept START deposits from account owners putting money into their accounts under the wire to meet the yearly deadline to qualify for a deduction from Louisiana taxable income of up to \$4,800 per account and state matching contributions (earnings enhancements). Prior to Gov. Bobby Jindal declaring Dec. 31, 2009 a state holiday, LOSFA had informed START account owners that they would be able to make in-person payments that day. So, a small group of LOSFA employees -- START's Terri Finley and PIC's Michelle Darling, Jerri Mack and Rhonda Bridevaux -- worked through the holiday to honor the agency's committment to account owners.

Account owners from as far away as Lake Charles brought deposits to the LOSFA office on Dec. 31st. While the majority of state workers enjoyed their day off, LOSFA employees were on-hand to help out.

"We were very steady on Thursday," Michelle Darling, Public Information and Communications Supervisor, said. "We accepted more than \$463,000 in deposits and answered 111 phone calls. The vast majority of callers needed information about START deposits and directions" to the LOSFA office.

The total amount of START deposits collected that day -- including those brought into the LOSFA office and those accepted by wire transfer -- totalled \$965,000, according to Mary Jane Lange, Director of Finance and Accounting.

Total deposits credited to START Saving Program accounts from December 28 thru December 31, 2009, were \$4,582,775.50.
