LA GEAR UP Day at the Capitol

Governor Jindal and the Louisiana House of Representatives declared May 11 as Louisiana Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (Louisiana GEAR UP) Day. In the Proclamation, Governor Jindal states, "Whereas Louisiana GEAR UP currently serves 3,000 high school seniors in 30 schools in 12 Louisiana Parishes; and Whereas the State of Louisiana is committed to providing a quality education for all students and helping them achieve their highest potential, I, Bobby Jindal, Governor

of the State of Louisiana, do hereby proclaim May 11, 2015, as Louisiana GEAR UP Day in the State of Louisiana." Representative Robert Johnson personally presented Dr. Tireka Cobb, assistant director of LA GEAR UP, with a resolution from the Louisiana House of Representatives. The resolution states, "Whereas, it is appropriate to recognize Monday, May 11, 2015, as Louisiana GEAR UP Day at the state capitol and to welcome the outstanding student leaders from Louisiana GEAR UP as they share how this exceptional program has impacted them and over twenty thousand low income students within the past twelve years."

Louisiana GEAR UP student leaders and state officers gathered in the State Capitol Rotunda from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. to celebrate Louisiana GEAR UP Day by sharing with legislators, their staffers, and the general public their schools' display boards describing the impact the program has made on them, their school, and community. Student leaders wore name badges that not only introduced who they were and what school they attended, but the badges also included the name of the postsecondary institution they would be attending during the summer or later in the fall of 2015.

Avoyelles High, East Feliciana High, Rayville High, and Pleasant Hill High School had display boards featured in the Capitol Rotunda during the event. The display boards from these schools were selected at the 2015 Louisiana GEAR UP Explorers' Club Summit for outstanding display design, creativity, and content. These boards illustrated 2015 Louisiana GEAR UP supported activities, such as college campuses they visited/toured around the state during the academic year.

Explorers' Club state officers Oscar McClain, Governor from Scotlandville High, Ariel Battley, Lieutenant Governor from Glen Oaks High, and Darius Spurlock, Attorney General from Scotlandville High also attended the event.

Explorers' Clubs are student-run organizations that provide peer leadership opportunities as a component of the LA GEAR UP program. Explorers' Club members are charged with making wise academic and behavioral decisions leading them to success in postsecondary education. They are also tasked with helping other students at their school make wise decisions as well.

GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) is a federal college access initiative providing students and families the support and resources they need for college success. While at the Capitol, LA GEAR UP staff discussed with visitors and legislators what services are offered to high school seniors in the program.




































LOSFA Plans to Begin TOPS Processing for 2015 High School Graduates on June 11

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA) plans to begin TOPS initial eligibility processing for 2015 high school graduates on June 11, 2015.

TOPS evaluation and eligibility determination can only be made for those students whose parents granted consent for LOSFA to receive their academic data. Parents who initially denied such consent, or failed to turn in their consent forms last fall and now wish to grant consent should:

- go to www.osfa.la.gov
- click the red "Forms" button on the menu on the left side of the homepage
- click "Scholarships/Grants (TOPS) Forms"
- download and print the "Consent Form"
- sign and return the form to the student's high school

If consent was initially denied and the student is now over 18, the student may download the "18-Year-Old

Consent Form", sign and return it to their high school. If consent was already given by a parent, the student does not need to submit another form after turning 18.

Students with an active "Louisiana Award System" account on the LOSFA Website will be notified of their TOPS eligibility or ineligibility by Email upon determination of their status. To register and create an account on the "Louisiana Award System":

- Go to www.osfa.la.gov
- Click on the blue "Louisiana Award System" button on the menu on the left side of the homepage
- Click "Register" and follow the instructions.

Once signed into the Louisiana Award System, the student should immediately enter, or update, their contact information as all future updates to their award status will be sent to the Email address provided. *LOS-FA will no longer notify TOPS applicants of their eligibility status by mail.*

Spurlock to Participate in GEAR UP Alumni Leadership Academy

Spurlock is one of 29 selected from a nationwide pool of applicants



Local resident, Darius D. Spurlock, has been chosen for the highly competitive UP GEAR Alumni Academy Leadership (GUALA), Class of 2016. The GUALA program identifies students with exceptional leadership potential and provides additional training and

tools to help them more effectively engage their peers, schools, and community in creating a college-going culture.

GEAR UP, or Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs, is a federally funded college readiness and success program that provides services to approximately 551,000 students in low-income schools across 43 states and 1 territory. This region is served by Louisiana GEAR UP, which is based within the Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA), and currently serves over 3,000 students in 30 schools and 12 parishes across the state.

In order to better support the GEAR UP mission nationwide, the National Council for Community and Education Partnerships (NCCEP) created the GUALA program, with the support of the Kresge Foundation. GUALA works to advance college and career readiness in communities by providing 12 months of training for Alumni Leaders on topics related to peer-to-peer outreach and mentoring, social media engagement, public speaking, and education policy.

Spurlock will participate in the year-long GUALA training program in order to better serve his GEAR UP community. As part of the program, Spurlock will

travel to Washington, DC for a week-long intensive leadership training, where he will interact with national policymakers and leaders.

"Mr. Spurlock's countless contributions to the community make him a great fit for this position," said LA GEAR UP Assistant Director, Dr. Tireka Cobb. "He is an advocate for higher education, and he promotes postsecondary education not only to his peers but to everyone he meets," she continued.

Darius is an active member of the True Vine Baptist Church of Baton Rouge, LA where he has been involved in numerous church-related activities throughout the community. His most recent honor, the prestigious Scotlandville Magnet High School Principal's Award, was presented to him for his dedication to excellence and peer leadership.

"While his accomplishments are many, Darius is most proud of being selected to share his GEAR UP story with over 2,000 GEAR UP directors, coordinators, and students at the 2014 National GEAR UP Conference held last summer in Washington, DC," Cobb added.

"Darius Deonbre Spurlock embodies what Louisiana GEAR UP is all about and he is committed to helping the program achieve continued success in the future," Cobb concluded.
