LOSFA will conduct its seventh annual "Financial Aid Call-In Night" on Monday, February 9, 2009 from 6-9 p.m.

During these special nighttime hours, callers may contact LOSFA with questions about all forms of state and federal student financial assistance, including the Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS), need based grants, student loans, and the Student Tuition Assistance and Revenue Trust (START) program – Louisiana's 529 college saving plan.

LOSFA's public information representatives will also provide on-the-spot advice and assistance for completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – also known as the FAFSA – which is the convenient single application for most state and federal student aid programs.

Callers from outside the Baton Rouge area may use LOSFA's toll-free number, 1-800-259-5626, Ext. 1012. Callers within the Baton Rouge area may use the local number, (225) 922-1012.

LOSFA's normal call-in hours for student financial assistance information are 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The annual "Financial Aid Call-In Night" is designed to assist callers who are unable to call during regular business hours. LOSFA participates in Homeless Conference in New Orleans

The College Goal Sunday Task Force has been meeting for several months in preparation for Louisiana's upcoming 2nd annual College Goal Sunday event on Sunday, February 15, 2009. Recently Ms. Laverne Dunn, Louisiana's Statewide Homeless Coordinator, joined the task force. During the task force meeting in November she educated everyone on the McKinney-Vento Act.

This act was reauthorized by President Bush on January 8, 2002. The portion of the McKinney-Vento Act related to the education of homeless children and youth, Subtitle VII-B, requires that local educational agencies carry out policies to ensure that homeless children and youth have access to free, appropriate public education, on the same basis as children and youth with established residences. Laws, regulations, practices or policies should not act as barriers to the enrollment, attendance or school success of homeless students.

Issues that hamper school enrollment of homeless students, such as residency requirements, immunization records, transfer/school records, birth certificates, free/reduced lunch, school fees and guardianship are addressed under Louisiana Law and RS: 17:238, Board of Elementary and Secondary Policies.

After receiving our thorough education, Ms. Dunn invited LOSFA staff to attend an upcoming Homeless Conference in New Orleans on December 2nd and 3rd. This was the 15th Annual Homeless Conference to take place on behalf of UNITY of Greater New Orleans and 60 partner agencies throughout the state.

The theme of this year's conference was "Ending Homelessness through Recovery, Rebuilding and Rehousing." LOSFA staff was able to participate in a workshop entitled Effective Strategies for Homeless Youth. The extent of LOSFA's participation was to inform the attendees about the upcoming College Goal Sunday event as well as the new HERO account brochure, a brochure that promotes the START Saving Program's category VI account, a college savings account that anyone can open for a non-related student in need.

The last day of the conference was a very eye-opening and educational experience due to the fact that LOSFA staff was given the opportunity to take a two hour "Homeless Tour" of New Orleans. The tour consisted of several stops throughout the area in which many homeless people gathered after hurricane Katrina, rebuilding efforts and, unfortunately, several areas that are still severely damaged.

Freelance photographer scores with snap of rival fans

Troy State's misplaced hope lands on Sports Illustrated site

It was only the second football game that he'd shot, but Matt Lange captured an image that was seen by sports fans across the country.

"It was really surprising," he said, about hearing his photograph was on the Sports Illustrated Web site. Lange, the son of LOSFA's Mary Jane Lange, shoots freelance photos for SouthCreek Sports Media, a wire service that provides pictures to the national media.

It was early in the LSU v. Troy game, when it looked like the Tigers were going to lose, that he snapped a picture of Troy fans celebrating. It was the last picture he took that day. He didn't realize it at the time, but LSU was about to turn the game around in a big way -- making his photograph more poignant. He filed the photo as normal and thought no more of it.

Then he got an email from another photographer who had been at the game -- letting him know his work had been picked up. He immediately called his boss at SouthCreek to let him know and "kind of had a little meltdown," he said. "Everybody was really excited."

While his day job is working as a graphic designer/video editor for Maxon Media, his freelance career started almost accidentally. He bought a Web site (mattlange. com) to post pictures he'd taken as a hobby. "And then people started wanting to give me money" to take photographs for them, he said. With the blessings of his Maxon bosses, he started working freelance. The side business has grown via word-of-mouth alone -- he does no actual advertising. He was recruited by SouthCreek after a photograph he took for one of Maxon's clients caught their eye.

The work he does for South-Creek is "strictly spec work," he said. He could take 100 photographs, but that doesn't mean anyone is going to publish them. "That's the bittersweet side of it," he said. So, to have a photo picked up so quickly is remarkable.

Lange has no plans to leave his day job. "I really like where I work now. For now, I'm content

In every issue of LOSFA LOOP, we will highlight a specific division within the agency. This issue we highlight:

Default Recoveries

Sometimes, despite the best efforts, borrowers fail to repay their loans and fall into default. When that happens, it falls to Default Recoveries to attempt to recover as much money as possible.

Byron Henderson, Default Recoveries Administrator, heads a staff of 30 employees. When a borrower has "failed to take responsibility for their loan," they step in and impose "all the penalties they were warned about."

Those penalties include being reported to the credit bureau, the addition of collection costs to the amount owed, an inability to take out additonal student loans or to receive Pell Grants or other Title IV funding, denied access to college transcripts, the denial of professional license renewals and denial of forebearance or deferements.

Henderson said the department uses a "carrots and big stick" approach to getting defaulted borrowers to repay their loans. If a borrower agrees to make voluntary payments, they can work their way out of default via the Rehabilitation Program -- that's the carrot. If they won't voluntarily repay, their wages are garnished and any state or federal payment can be taken -- including Social Security benefits, travel payments and tax refunds. That's the big stick. itation Program. That program allows borrowers to climb out of default, begin to repair their credit and establish a history of on-time payments. It also allows borrowers to reestablish eligibility for Title IV funding.

"We're very blessed that we have a lender that will purchase the Rehabilitation loans (LELA). With the economy, many lenders have pulled out," he said. There is a fairly low redefault rate in the Rehabilitation Program, around 4 percent, he said. That's good for the borrowers, lenders and LOSFA.

LOSFA's Rehabilitation Program has been so successful that Henderson anticipates the programs first \$1 million sale in January. Each month, LELA buys the eligible loans from LOS-FA. The larger the monthly portfolio, the more borrowers in the program. The more borrowers in the program, the better for all involved.

In addition to the Rehabilitation Program and involuntary garnishments, Default Recoveries also helps defaulted borrowers consolidate their defaulted debt. That cures the initial problem -- the default -- but it does not help establish a pattern of repayment and credit repair that the Rehabilitation Program does.

LOSFA attends SWASFAA Conference

LOSFA Staff missed the rare snow fall in Baton Rouge due to being in attendance at the SWASFAA (Southwest Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators) Conference in Little Rock, AR on December 10th through December 12th.

Key issues discussed were ethics, customer service and communicating with students. One of the highlights of the conference was a workshop that included an overview of the 2009-10 Free Application for Federal Student Aid due to the fact that there have been several changes made. A reception was hosted for the conference attendees at the President Clinton Library. Next year's SWAS-FAA Conference will take place in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

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"The whole goal of collections is to liquidate the debt," Henderson said. "Not every shoe fits every person."

For the 2007- 2008 State Fiscal Year, 874 took part in the Rehabilitation Program. Those numbers are up from 2006-2007 when 635 chose Rehabilitation.

Henderson said he would not be surprised if the final tally of Rehabilitation borrowers reached 1,000 by the fiscal year's end on June 30, 2009. Those numbers are what the department is striving for, focusing on getting as many people into the program as possible.
