LOSFA Extends Hours for Special Financial Aid Call-In and Facebook Chat Night

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA) will conduct its annual "Financial Aid Call-In and Facebook Chat Night" on Monday, Feb. 6, from 6-9 p.m.

During these special evening hours, callers may contact LOSFA with questions about the Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS), other federal and state student aid programs, and the Student Tuition Assistance and Revenue Trust (START) Saving Program -- Louisiana's 529 college savings plan.

LOSFA's customer service representatives will also provide on-the-spot advice and assistance for completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid -- also known as the FAFSA -- which is the convenient single ap-

plication for most state and federal aid programs.

Callers from outside the Baton Rouge area may use the toll-free number at (800) 259-5626, Ext. 1012. Callers from inside the Baton Rouge area may use the local number at 219-1012.

Students and parents who are active on Facebook are encouraged to "like" LOSFA's Facebook page. After doing so, questions may be submitted on the LOSFA Facebook page and will be answered immediately during the two hour "live chat".

LOSFA's normal call-in hours for student financial aid information are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The annual "Financial Aid Call-In Night" is designed to assist callers who are unable to call during regular business hours.

► All public and non-public high schools and middle schools in the state have had their school accounts activated and lead counselors (Community Administrators) have been assigned.

► Public middle and high school counselors have been provided with instructions on how to assist students in activating their individual accounts.

► With assistance from the Louisiana Department of Education (LDOE), demographic data from the Student Information System (SIS) for all public middle and high school students has been loaded and the process of student and parent account activation is underway.

►Non-Public middle and high school lead counselors (Louisiana Connect Community Administrators) have been provided with instructions on how to submit demographic data to pre-populate accounts for their students. The process of receiving and loading this data is underway.

► Again in cooperation with the LDOE, the Individual Graduation Plan module is still on track for a mid-to-late January launch.

►LOSFA Assistant Executive Director of Marketing and Outreach, David Roberts, and ConnectEDU Louisiana State Director, Brian Dennis, are planning a mid-January media tour around the state to raise awareness of the portal and encourage student and parent account activation.

►LOSFA has enlisted the assistance of our Trailblazers in taking the lead in activating their individual Louisiana Connect accounts, assisting their guidance counselors in getting the word out to their peers, and encouraging their fellow students to activate their accounts.

The first Trailblazer to respond was Grace White from Southwood High School. Grace made the following post on the Trailblazer Facebook page:

"I have set up my account on Louisiana Connect! I am in the process of getting the rest of my classmates at Southwood High School registered. I'll keep y'all posted on what is happening."

Louisiana Connect College and Career Access Portal Ready for Student and Parent Account Activation

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance (LOSFA) recently announced the launch of a media tour intended to raise awareness among Louisiana middle and high school students and parents about the comprehensive new, nationally acclaimed, Louisiana Connect College Access and Career Planning Web Portal.

Louisiana Connect provides tools and resources to help students plan for life after high school, find colleges where they can be successful and launch rewarding careers. Importantly, Louisiana Connect provides guidance counselors, parents, teachers and advisors with a full suite of tracking dashboards, reporting capabilities, and communication tools to help students navigate the process.

As part of this statewide initiative, the data-driven web portal is designed to give students, parents, counselors, and administrators a "one stop shop" for college and career planning. This centralized tool provides students with access to create an online portfolio, including career assessments, GPAs, course history, test scores, graduation requirements, and extracurricular activities– in addition to providing them with alerts on key milestones for college applications, scholarships, and financing deadlines.

Students and parents can access the online portfolio virtually anywhere. Students will have the ability to view their progress as they explore their career interests, build a resume, and college list. Parents can also suggest colleges and scholarships to their child, chart historical college admission outcomes, and calculate financial aid information.

LOSFA's goal is to provide every Louisiana student with the opportunity to successfully pursue and persist in a postsecondary education environment. This exciting new tool is being offered to Louisiana students and families at no cost. Parents and students are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity by registering for their accounts today. Student registrations are underway under the supervision of guidance counselors at both public and non-public middle and high schools throughout the state. Parents may enroll by visiting: www.louisianaconnect.org, clicking the first time login icon, then selecting the parent option, and entering their child's information.

The Louisiana Connect portal was designed and constructed (according to LOSFA specifications) by ConnectEDU®, the Web-based leader in empowering students to manage their education, launch their careers, and secure a more stable financial future. ConnectEDU currently has similar portals in five states including Louisiana, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Michigan and Texas.

One of the major benefits of the portal will be the ability to match high school students with colleges and other postsecondary programs that best fit their future educational and career goals. The practical application of this particular feature (as developed by ConnectEDU) as a means of revolutionizing the college admissions process has received national recognition from a number of sources, including the Chronicle of Higher Education. In a recent posting, Chronicle writer Marc Parry wrote:

One company getting buzz is ConnectEDU, sometimes described as an eHarmony for college matchmaking. Its founder and CEO, Craig Powell, dreams that students won't even have to apply to college "because an algorithm will have already told them and the schools where they would fit best."

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"Louisiana Connect is one of the most comprehensive college and career planning resources available to students today," said Powell. "With these tools, Louisiana students will be empowered to manage their education, launch their careers, and secure a more stable financial future," he concluded.

"This technology represents the cutting edge of college access and career planning in the twentyfirst century," said LOSFA Executive Director Melanie Amrhein. "And, for once, this is not something that's happening only in states like Massachusetts...it is actually happening right here in Louisiana," she continued. "In fact, we believe that the Louisiana Connect portal is the most comprehensive and inclusive such site in existence today," Amrhein added.

"In addition," Amrhein said, "we would be remiss if we did not acknowledge the unprecedented level of cooperation and support LOSFA has received from the Louisiana Department of Education both in the form of data sharing and in promoting the use of the Louisiana Connect portal to the state's middle and high schools."

Specifically, the portal allows students to:

- Connect with colleges and universities that are a match for their educational and career goals
- Learn about careers and connect with employers
- Find scholarships and other programs designed to help the student succeed
- Access an exclusive News Feed and Event Planner
- Build a profile to highlight individual skills and achievements
- Learn how a college education can be affordable
- Compare costs and academic offerings from various in and out of state schools

Other Louisiana Connect portal highlights include:

► Individual Graduation Plan: Integration of state-mandated Individual Graduation Plan (5-Year Plan), driving all 8th-12th grade students to the web portal

► Data Integration: Louisiana Department of Education student data loaded into the web portal, prepopulating student profiles, and driving college, scholarship and career matching

College Searching & Matching: Guided college searching, matching and comparison tools

Scholarship Searching & Matching: Scholarship searching and matching, including the ability for counselors to upload local scholarships

► Career Exploration & Planning: Interest, Skills & Values assessments mapped to occupation profiles, internships, and career planning strategies

► Dashboards & Reporting: Resources that empower counselors to help students stay on track to graduate

Another major component of the Louisiana Connect portal is the Talent Connect[™] module which allows students to connect with potential employers. Some of the state's largest employers, including Bollinger Shipyards, Roy O. Martin, and CLECO, are already on-board and many more are in the process of finalizing their participation. The Talent Connect feature will allow qualified students to apply for internships, part time and summer employment, scholarships, and other opportunities in industries they feel are relevant to their educational and career goals.
