

Louisiana College Application Month

The Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance and education stakeholders in the State of Louisiana, have collaborated to develop and implement Louisiana College Application Month for high school seniors in October 2014 as part of the American College Application Campaign.

The American College Application Campaign (ACAC), an effort of the American Council on Education (ACE), is a national initiative to increase the number of first-generation and low-income students who pursue a postsecondary education. The purpose is to help high school seniors navigate the college admissions process and to ensure that each participating student submits at least one admission application. This initiative began in 2005 in one high school in North Carolina and has since

expanded to all states and the District of Columbia. In the 2013 ACAC Program, 2,513 high schools and 153,114 students nationwide participated in this endeavor. As a result, 219,855 college applications were submitted.

In 2013, the Louisiana GEAR UP program, in conjunction with the Lafayette GEAR UP program, launched its Louisiana College Application Week pilot program. The program was conducted in 12 Louisiana parishes at 18 different high schools and a total of 1,049 students from the two participating Louisiana GEAR UP programs completed at least one application for college admission.

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Louisiana College Application Month continued

Due to the success of the Louisiana College Application Week pilot, LOSFA is expanding this initiative from one week to the entire month of October. This will allow more schools to participate in the activities, which will lead to more students being assisted. LOSFA is also expanding the program beyond the GEAR UP schools and is inviting all interested Louisiana high

schools to participate. Participating schools should host a day event to excite students about applying to college. These day events benefit all students, not only seniors, by encouraging to develop an early interest in getting involved in the college admissions process.

Recent college enrollment data obtained by the Louisiana Department of Education shows that only 56 percent of Louisiana high school seniors who graduated in May 2012 enrolled in college for the Fall 2012 semester. Only 66 percent of those May 2012 graduates were enrolled by Fall 2013. Thus, 34 percent of May 2012 graduates hadn't enrolled at a postsecondary institution within a year of graduation, which decreases the likelihood of their future enrollment. Initiatives like College Application Month are designed to promote a college-going culture in schools. This initiative also encourages students to find and apply to a college that's the best match for them, which increases their rate of success in postsecondary endeavors.

According to federal estimates, nearly 8 in 10 new jobs will require some postsecondary education or training after high school. In the current economy, a high school diploma is no longer enough to earn a

TOPS BULLETIN 2014-3

As of September 1, 2014, LOSFA has removed the display of social security numbers from the Louisiana Award System screens, reports and all outgoing file transmissions. LOSFA has modified many of its file formats to make these changes. In an effort to assist the colleges, LOSFA will continue to receive social security numbers in the import files, and the SSNs will automatically be encrypted once the files are received in our system. LOSFA will only download files containing SSNs when an encrypted FTP process is used. These file formats have been modified to include the LOSFA ID and the SSN. Data downloads retrieved through the Award System's "Reports" tab will no longer include SSNs. Instead, this data can be retrieved through the LOSFA ID, student's name and date of birth.

TOPS Bulletin 2014-4

In order to determine a student's TOPS payment eligibility, institutions should review the TOPS Award Level, Disposition (Status) and Eligible Term Not Paid (Only Term Eligible) for all awarded students on either the TOPS Master Roster or the TOPS Student Roster on the Louisiana Award System. If a student is not listed as eligible for TOPS, then a payment request cannot be sent. TOPS Opportunity, Performance, Honors and Tech award level recipients are eligible for TOPS funding if they're enrolled full-time on the 15th day of class during the semester.

TOPS Tech recipients must be enrolled in a technical program to receive funding. For TOPS Tech recipients, payment requests for an academic program type will be rejected. The program types for billing and grades must be the same for each semester. If they are not, there will be a substantial delay in processing students' TOPS eligibility for subsequent semesters. TOPS Payment

Error Reports are available for each institution on the Louisiana Award System. Each institution is responsible for reviewing the error roster, making the appropriate corrections and resubmitting corrected payment requests for eligible students.


Khristopher Hobbs, Program Coordinator
